Alaska Instruction Requirements

INSTRUCTIONAL DAYS

- Alaska mandates a minimum of 180 instructional days per school year
- Up to 10 days can be used for non-instructional purposes:

In-service education | Teacher conferences | Professional development

INSTRUCTIONAL HOURS PER DAY (EXCLUDING INTERMISSIONS)

- Grades 1-3 | Minimum of 4 hours of instruction
- Grades 4-12 | Minimum of 5 hours of instruction

State to State Comparison

INSTRUCTIONAL HOURS

Too many variables exist across states, making a state-to-state comparison challenging.

Examples of variables:

- Requirements often by grade band (e.g., elementary vs. secondary schools).
- Policies that may include or exclude passing times, recess, and lunch in the total instructional hours.
- States differing in whether instructional time is measured in daily or weekly minutes.
